Your baby did not pass the newborn hearing screening. This means your child may have trouble hearing. Your baby will need a second test to be sure.

### Don't wait to get help for your baby!



Studies show that babies with hearing loss can learn language if:

- <sup>®</sup> Hearing loss is found early;
- <sup>©</sup> Hearing aids are fitted by 3 months of age;
- <sup>©</sup> A baby is enrolled in Early Intervention by 6 months of age.

## What if my baby doesn't pass the hearing test?





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By 3 months old:

- <sup>©</sup> Make an appointment right away with one of the facilities listed in this brochure. Most health insurance plans will help pay for the hearing tests.
- <sup>©</sup> Please verify that your insurance is accepted before scheduling an appointment.

### By 6 months old:

- <sup>©</sup> Contact your Early Intervention (EI) program as soon as possible. If your child is enrolled into EI, you will have a team of professionals who will work with you and your child. For more information, call 503-947-5738 or visit www.ode.state.or.us.
- <sup>©</sup> Find out if your child needs assistance with his or her hearing. By starting early, you can help your child communicate. If you have problems getting help, have your child's doctor call the EHDI Program to apply for a loaner hearing aid.
- <sup>©</sup> Learn about resources to help your child. There are many programs ready to support you and your child. A Family Resource Guide, including information about hearing loss and resources throughout Oregon, can be found at healthoregon.org/ehdi or by calling 1-888-917-HEAR (4327) to order a free copy.
